Mac Update

We are often criticised for not devoting more time to the PC's adversary, the Mac. SumProduct has no particular axe to grind, it's more we note most businesses use PCs and we're rather partial to the ALT button. No death threats please!

On March 5, Microsoft released a Preview of Office for Mac 2016, with the full suite due to launch in the second half of the year. Relevant for our readers, included in the preview of Office for Mac 2016 with One Note, Outlook, PowerPoint and Word is our good friend Excel.

In order to install the preview, Macs purchased from 2008 onwards should work, provided that the Mac is running Yosemite. The installation is located at Microsoft's Office for Mac Preview site: http://products.office.com/en-US/mac/mac-preview .

Every application gets a Yosemite look and feel and apps are optimised to work with the Retina display. Office will also offer the Yosemite fullscreen mode and even scroll bounce (we will pretend we know what that is...). The only Yosemite features which will remain unavailable are auto-saving, renaming, moving, tagging or locking documents using the document title bar.

Microsoft has stated that the preview will be updated regularly and that users will be notified to updates via the Mac Auto-Update tool. It should be stressed that this download is the equivalent of a "beta" and Microsoft has advised that, "...some features aren't final or may not work. We recommend that you always download and run the latest update so that you are using the most up to date features", but it should complement the iOS versions of Word, Excel, PowerPoint and Outlook which we mentioned back in September last year.



The preview is free but when the suite ships later this year it will require an Office 365 subscription or the purchase of a standalone copy, otherwise you will be able to use the Preview copy for a further month before access is limited to read only / print.

Each build of the preview will expire after 60 days, but new builds will come regularly. The last build will stop working a month after the software launches, consistent with the licensing process.

Microsoft states that you may use the preview builds at the same time as the 2011 edition. No reported issues have surfaced at the time of writing.

It is intended that the new apps are designed to give users a similar

experience on all devices, so if you are using the Office apps on Windows, Mac, iOS or the web (or Android) you will use them in the same way. With this borne in mind, Microsoft has updated the Ribbon so that it is similar to the Office for Windows 2013 version. Microsoft says that the redesigned ribbon "intuitively organises features so you can quickly find what you need quickly". So that's going to be a new Ribbon then ^(C)

Of most interest to our readers, Excel will now support the majority of the Windows version's keyboard shortcuts in addition to Mac's keyboard commands. After 20,000 years out in the wilderness, this means that CTRL + C will copy and CTRL + V will paste, as well a CMD + C / CMD + V.



There's other improvements too. Excel will also offer more advanced analysis tools – the new Analysis ToolPak – which will offer advanced statistical functions, including moving averages and exponential smoothing slicers for pivot tables, as well as auto-complete features for inserting functions and filling in cell data.

Maybe soon we won't need Parallels...

Reader's Question



Is it possible to have a dynamic chart title, i.e. one that changes depending on data selected?

This is a specific query for a general question. The answer is very simple. After constructing the chart, add a chart title, select it, but then type a formula into the formula bar instead (as illustrated above).

Don't be deceived by the example formula used – the sheet title comes up in the formula by default, but only simple cell references on the <u>same</u> sheet that the chart is on may be used. If you want to refer to another sheet, linking to another sheet or using range names will not work – but there is a way round. All you have to do is move the chart to the sheet in question, create the link then move it back.

Is this a top tip..?

The winning entry suggested using GoTo (F5) and Special to select blanks in order to paste in missing formulae.
