So to recap...

Windows 10 Upgrade came out last month.



Available as free upgrade for qualified Windows 7, Windows 8.1 and Windows Phone 8.1 devices, upgraders were rolled out from Wednesday 29 July, simply by clicking on the 'Get Windows 10 App' in the status bar: →

The only requirements were that the device is compatible, and that the device is running genuine Windows 7 Service Pack 1 (SP1) or Windows 8.1 (Update). It was designed to run on Windows 7 and Windows 8.1 PCs, but there were problems for Excel users – only discovered after our print deadline date for last month's newsletter...



10-Tative Power Pivot..?

No sooner had the upgrade been implemented than reports on various Excel fora began to circulate that Windows 10, Excel 2010 and Power Pivot might not be mixing well. Some – we stress, not all – users were reporting that after they have installed Windows 2010, Excel 2010 would not launch with PowerPivot enabled.



Attempting to activate the COM add-in via Options > Add-ins > Manage Disabled Item > PowerPivot > Enable appeared to crash Excel instantly and modelling communities worldwide confirmed they could replicate this bug.

It is worth noting that users with earlier versions of Power Pivot, such as Microsoft SQL Server 2008 R2 – PowerPivot for Microsoft Excel 2010, reported that their editions still appeared to work. However, rolling back the COM add-in appeared to be a backward – and embarrassing step for Microsoft.

First suggested Power Pivot 2010 solution



Microsoft announced that the problem lay with the version of .NET (version 4.6), which was installed as part of the update. Apparently, .NET version 4.6 included a new Just-In-Time (JIT) compiler for 64-bit processes, called **RyuJIT**, which was what was causing the current problem.

As an interim measure, Microsoft initially recommended that the quick workaround was apparently to disable RyuJIT via a registry key or by using PowerShell:

- Registry key: Under HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SOFTWARE\Microsoft\.NETFramework add
 "useLegacyJit" DWORD with a value of 1;
- **PowerShell:** Set-ItemProperty -Path HKLM:\Software\Microsoft\.NETFramework -Name useLegacyJit -Type DWord -Value 1.

This appeared to be a workable interim solution.

Second – and current – suggested Power Pivot 2010 solution0

It transpired that there was a similar issue discovered by some users who had installed Visual Studio 2015.



As a result, Microsoft made a formal announcement. It transpired that with the release of these two products an issue was uncovered – previously undetected – in the 64-bit versions of the following products:

- Power Pivot for Microsoft Excel 2010; and
- Data Mining Add-ins for Microsoft Excel (Table Analysis Tools and Data Mining Client).

When installing either of these products, .NET (version 4.6), the default .NET version that comes with Windows 10 and Visual Studio 2015, users discovered that opening Excel with either add-in enabled resulted in Excel crashing. When users then attempted to re-start Excel, one of the following error messages appears:

- For PowerPivot for Microsoft Excel 2010: "Excel experienced a serious problem with 'Power Pivot for Excel' add-in. If you have seen this message multiple times, you should disable this add-in and check to see if an update is available. Do you want to disable this add-in?"
- For the Data Mining Add-ins: "Excel experienced a serious problem with 'sqlserver.dmclientxladdin' add-in. If you have seen this message multiple times, you should disable this add-in and check to see if an update is available. Do you want to disable this add-in?".

Microsoft is still continuing to investigate the issue and agree a final fix. In the meantime, a workaround has been provided by allowing Excel to use the previous 64-bit JIT for .NET by adding a file to your Excel folder as follows:

- Navigate to the folder with your Excel executable (Excel.exe), usually "C:\Program Files\Microsoft Office\Office14". If you cannot find the folder:
 - Open windows explorer
 - Select This PC
 - Search for "Excel.exe" in the "Search this PC" box on the upper right side of Explorer
 - Right-click on the file and select "open file location"
- Create a file "Excel.exe.config" in this folder and then open the file with notepad and add the following contents:



- Save the file
- · Reopen Excel.

Adding this file causes Excel to use the same 64-bit JIT as was available the previous version of .NET. When a 'proper' fix has been released for this issue, users might wish to change this behaviour back to the default JIT by deleting the file just created in the workaround.

Excel 2007 Patch Released



Since Tuesday 11 August, users of Office 2007 — not just Excel 2007 — who have not installed the latest security update will no longer be able to access online templates. If you haven't ever checked out these templates, you should take some time to browse: there are some useful files in here. However, if you have not installed the said patch, when they try to access online templates, a single template thumbnail appears with text telling users to update Office to regain access to templates.

This only affects Office 2007. Users of Office 2010 and Office 2013 who have not installed the update will not lose access to the online templates. Do bear in mind though this is not an update to fix access to online

templates; this is a security patch and Microsoft urges all users to install the patch as soon as possible to avoid the vulnerability to cyber-attack.

You may also notice in some Office 2007 programs, a category named 'Featured' that is not currently functional exists under the Microsoft Office Online heading in File, New. This issue is not related to the security update and will not change after installing this patch.
